Welcome to Parcevall Hall

Parcevall Hall warmly welcomes residential guests and day visitors all the year round.

Individual private guests and groups of many kinds, secular and religious, have come here to experience peace and tranquillity since the Hall opened as a Retreat House in 1963. Educational, music, art, yoga, singing, walking, parish and family groups come to the Hall for the space, calm and comfort they're seeking for their time together.

We encourage private bookings from groups and individuals, for a day or more of peace away from the distractions and busyness of daily life.

Individual guests – no single supplement, your own room

We regularly welcome guests who come away on their own for rest and relaxation.

They often make new friends during their stay, and enjoy the freedom to explore the surrounding countryside and villages from the comfort of the Hall. We don't charge a single supplement, and you won't be asked to share your room. Alternatively, bring a friend or partner to share time, companionship and peace in beautiful surroundings.

Food

One of the pleasures of spending time away is the joy of good food with none of the work. Our guests are very complimentary about our delicious home-cooked food, made with high quality fresh ingredients, locally sourced wherever possible. You will not go home hungry! We can cater for any dietary requirement.

Programmed events

We run a variety of events, details of which you'll find in this programme.

Parcevall's Lent retreat this year is led by our Chaplain, Canon Graham Bettridge *Mystery, music and mastery: Lenten Collects of Cranmer*. In March, Dr Rupert Sheldrake leads a two-day event for leaders and teachers in churches, cathedrals and other holy places, *Teaching spiritual practices*.

The very popular *Beginner's Birdwatching* returns in May, led again by ornithologist Chris Bradshaw. In June, a two-day retreat, *Temple Theology*, is an approach to Biblical Study led by its creator, Margaret Barker, who was awarded a Lambeth Degree by Rowan Williams for her '...significantly new contribution to our understanding of the New Testament'. Later in June Jill Benet leads her second Centering Prayer retreat for us, *Living the Contemplative Life: What gets in the way?* Erudite and engaging, Hugh Parry is the tutor for two Literature Appreciation retreats, the first on *Chaucer* in April, and the second, *Music in Literature* in September. Tim Stimson leads two Art Appreciation retreats; in April *The Glasgow Boys* and in August, *Swedish Impressionism*. Tim lectures for the Art Fund and the University of Cambridge. Please look through this programme to find others, including *Recorder Playing Workshops*, *Heart & Soul Singing Retreats*, *Fellowship of Contemplative Prayer* and *Anglican Association* retreats, *Walking in Wharfedale*, celebrations of Easter and Advent, and all *Friends of Parcevall Hall* gatherings.

Things to do and see

Parcevall is surrounded by its lovely gardens, and the scenic beauty of Wharfedale and the Yorkshire Dales National Park. The gardens, which are run and managed by Walsingham College, Yorkshire Properties, have been nominated for Historic Houses Garden of the Year Award, 2022.

The Dales Way is on our doorstep, and walkers regularly visit this part of the world to enjoy the stunning scenery, and the challenges of Wharfedale's hills. Fly fishing in the river Wharfe is excellent, widely considered to be one of the best brown trout rivers in the country. Day tickets for fishing can be purchased from nearby Bolton Abbey, Burnsall and Kilsney.

A short drive away are the attractive towns of Grassington (the location for the recent series of *All Creatures Great & Small*), Harrogate, Ilkley, Skipton and Pateley Bridge and in the other direction, the wild limestone landscapes of Littondale and beyond. There are numerous activities, attractions and places of interest (not to mention possibly one of the finest 'real' pubs in England!), all within easy reach.

Facilities

Parcevall Hall has 17 charming, clean and simple but comfortable bedrooms which can accommodate up to 28 people. Most guests stay on a full board basis, but if you would rather explore during the day, you can stay on either a dinner, bed and breakfast or B&B basis. If you let us know in advance, we can provide a packed lunch for a picnic. All meals are served in the Dining Room, which is one of the oldest parts of the Hall.

We have a small gift shop selling greetings cards, notebooks, chocolate and toiletries. We also sell a selection of our homemade jams and chutneys in season.

The downstairs Milner Room is the largest meeting area, which has a high quality audio-visual system. It has easy level access from the archway entrance. Upstairs is the writing room and a smaller, more intimate meeting room.

The Solar Lounge is one of guests' favourite gathering places, a welcoming and comfortable room where you will find the bar. The door from the Solar leads onto a private terrace, where you can sit and look out over the gardens to the rocky peak of Simon's Seat.

Parcevall has an indoor chapel. All are welcome to our services – please see 'Religious Services' below.

Booking

There is usually a high demand for spaces at our programmed events, and so bookings are on a first-come, first-served basis.

Booking forms for either events or private stays can be downloaded from our website and you will also find one in the centre of this programme. These can be posted or emailed to us. However, please contact us before sending a booking form to check availability. Once this is confirmed, a non-refundable and non-transferable deposit will secure your booking.

Most events and private stays begin at 4pm on your arrival day, unless alternative arrangements have been made with us in advance.

Exclusive use of the Hall is available for groups of 17 or more, or for smaller groups paying the equivalent amount.

Covid-19

At the time of writing, there are no Covid-19 restrictions in place. If this changes in 2023, we may need to change or cancel your booking. We also understand that you may need to change or cancel your booking with us if you are subject to Covid-19 restrictions or requirements. In these cases, we will offer you the option to either cancel, postpone or roll forward your booking to another date.

If Covid regulations are re-introduced which affect your booking, we will send you our current guest guidance, outlining what mitigations we have in place to help us keep you and our staff safe, and what we ask of you in return.

Religious Services

A service of Holy Communion is held in the Chapel each Tuesday at 10.15am, followed by coffee and biscuits served in the Solar Lounge. All are welcome.

The History of the Hall


The Hall was built on land which once belonged to Bolton Priory and is Grade II* Listed, its oldest part dating back to 1586.

Records show that *Persevall's Ferme* was bought by Sir John Yorke and occupied by his two sons at different times before coming into the possession of Christopher Lawson and his wife Elizabeth, who made additions to the house in 1671.

For the next two hundred years the house was occupied by a succession of farmers and tenants, including the Yorke family who returned for a short period in the 19th century.

Sir William Milner, the eighth baronet of Nun Appleton, bought the house in 1927 from a Skipton antique dealer, Frank Laycock. Sir William was a godson of Queen Mary and an architect by profession, and having acquired the house he set about restoring it with great skill and vision, taking care to preserve its original features. He reproduced these faithfully when he extended Parcevall, salvaging timbers from 17th-century buildings and employing local master craftsmen to cut and dress the stone, supply suitable leadwork, re-cast plaster mouldings and create the door latches and hinges of the period which are still in place.

He had a passion for plants and a strong aesthetic sense, which he expressed in the design of Parcevall's gardens, the planting of rare species collected in Western China and Tibet, and in his co-founding of Harlow Carr Gardens near Harrogate.

The work on the Hall began during the time of the 1920s depression. For local labourers, the generous wages paid by Sir William and the secure employment he provided earned him gratitude and respect.

In her history of the Milner Family, Dr Heather Beaumont notes that '...Parcevall Hall is probably one of the last country homes to be created by an English Gentleman'.

Sir William was a deeply religious and a shy man. He never married, and when he died in 1960 he bequeathed Parcevall Hall to the Guardians of the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham.

The Guardians now manage the estate and gardens, and the Hall is leased and run by the Church of England Diocese of Leeds.

Events Programme 2023

2023 includes, as usual, four **Quiet Days**. Please contact us to book your place. There is no charge, but please bring your own lunch and we will provide coffee and tea!

Each of our Quiet Days has a different leader. **Revd Tom Lusty** has often assisted our chaplain with our weekly service of Holy Communion, and leads the first of these days on 23 January. Tom began his ministry in the Yorkshire Dales in 2021 after many years in Leeds. He is the Vicar of Upper Wharfedale and Littondale.

Revd Canon Andrew Tawn is Director of Clergy Development for the Diocese of Leeds, and before that, was rector of Addingham. Andrew leads the Quiet Day on 3 April.

The third of these days, on 21 August, will be led by **The Very Revd Simon Cowling**. Simon was Rector of Bolton Priory until 2018, when he took up his current post as Dean of Wakefield.

The final day on 2 October will be led by **The Rt Revd Lord David Hope**. In 1991 he became Bishop of London, and in 1995, Archbishop of York. Following retirement in 2005 he returned to parish life as vicar of St Margaret's Ilkley. He has now retired.

Quiet Day I

God is friendship (Aelred of Rievaulx)

On this quiet day we will celebrate our friendships and how an understanding of friendship informs our friendship with God. For Aelred of Rievaulx, a great Yorkshire saint, friendship is the highest form of love. For him the two words are synonymous: to say 'God is friendship' is a powerful way of saying that God is love. Where there is friendship...God is there.

You are invited to bring with you an object that speaks to you of a precious friendship. This can be a friend who is currently living or someone who has died. There will be an opportunity to talk about this friendship if you would like to do so.

Tom was a volunteer on Iona after time studying biblical studies at University, and was warden of a retreat centre before ordination. He was a hospital chaplain and hospice chaplain in Leeds for nine years and has an MA in Healthcare Chaplaincy. During his time as a healthcare chaplain he led a series of retreats on the theme of friendship, including at Parcevall Hall. Tom was then a parish priest in north Leeds for 12 years, before beginning ministry in the Dales as Vicar of Upper Wharfedale and Littondale in June 2021. Tom is married to Helen who is Director of the Leeds Church Institute and they have two sons. Tom loves singing and there will be a musical element to the day.

Mystery, music and mastery: Lenten Collects of Cranmer

We journey through Lent this year led by our Chaplain.

Graham trained from an early age at the House of the Sacred Mission, Kelham. He was ordained into the Bradford Diocese by Bishop Michael Parker, and his ordination retreat was spent at Parcevall, then the newly acquired Retreat House of the Diocese of Bradford. He served twelve years in a variety of posts before leaving the Diocese, becoming the Team Rector of the seven Rainbow Parishes, based in Kirkby Lonsdale. He remains an Honorary Canon of Carlisle, and was Senior Chaplain of Cumbria Police Service from 1992 until 2012. Bishop Nick Baines appointed him Honorary Chaplain to Parcevall Hall in 2007.

Teaching spiritual practices: new possibilities for cathedrals, churches and church schools

Leader: Dr Rupert Sheldrake

Recent scientific research has shown that, in general, people who have regular religious or spiritual practices are happier, healthier, and live longer. Rupert has written two books on the scientific study of spiritual practices, *Science and Practices* and *Ways to Go Beyond and Why They Work*, each of which explore seven different practices. Nowadays, a range of spiritual practices are taught in secular settings, like mindfulness meditation, yoga, and spiritual openings through psychedelics. The participants in this Parcevall Hall

weekend will explore how spiritual practices could be taught more widely through Christian institutions. Can churches, cathedrals and church schools help to promote practices which can give stronger personal experiences of spiritual connection? In particular Rupert will be looking at new possibilities for pilgrimage, and for the teaching of prayer, Christian meditation, fasting, and chanting, as well as the revisioning of festivals and holy days.

Rupert Sheldrake, PhD, is a biologist and author of more than ninety technical papers and nine books, including *The Science Delusion*. As a fellow of Clare College, Cambridge, he was Director of Studies in Cell Biology, and was also a research fellow of the Royal Society. He worked in Hyderabad, India, as Principal Plant Physiologist at the International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT), and also lived for two years in the Benedictine ashram of Fr Bede Griffiths in Tamil Nadu. From 2005-2010, he was Director of the Perrott-Warrick Project for the study of unexplained human and animal abilities, funded by Trinity College, Cambridge. He is currently a fellow of the Institute of Noetic Sciences in Petaluma, California and of Schumacher College in Dartington, Devon. He lives in London and is married to Jill Purce, with whom he has two sons. His website is www.sheldrake.org.

Literature Appreciation I Chaucer

Tutor: Hugh Parry

In this course we will range over a sample of the Canterbury Tales, the well-known and the less-known. Like the pilgrims who told them, they are a collection of 'all-sorts', from satire to romance, raunchy anecdotes to saints' lives, chivalry to folklore. Chaucer had no time to finish the project, but he envisaged it as a compendium of the narratives that circulated in the written and oral culture of the age. The theme of dreams, prominent in the earlier poems, will feature again. The texts will be a combination of modern versions and the originals – no-one will be left bewildered, but Middle English is a delight worth experiencing.

Hugh Parry has offered adult education classes in literature for over 30 years. Although loyal all his life to Shakespeare, he has over the years given courses on a diverse range of topics, including detective fiction, utopias, ghost stories,

Cowper, Swift and R S Thomas.





Temple Theology

Temple Theology is a fast-growing new way of biblical study, rediscovering the roots of Christianity in the world of the Jerusalem temple. We shall explore how temple symbolism, belief and practice shaped Christian faith and culture. Temple Theology is changing how we understand Christian origins and our relationship to Judaism.

Margaret Barker has developed an approach to Biblical Studies now known as Temple Theology. Margaret Barker read theology at Cambridge and went on to pursue her

research independently. She was elected President of the Society for Old Testament Study in 1998, and edited the Society's second Monograph Series, published by Ashgate. She has so far written 17 books, which form a sequence, later volumes building on her earlier conclusions.

Since 1997, she has been part of the symposium Religion, Science and the Environment, convened by His All Holiness Bartholomew I, the Ecumenical Patriarch. This work has led her to develop the practical implications of Temple Theology as the basis for a Christian environment theology.

In July 2008 Margaret Barker was awarded a Lambeth Degree of Doctor of Divinity by Rowan Williams, the then Archbishop of Canterbury, 'in recognition of her work on the Jerusalem Temple and the origins of Christian Liturgy, which has made a significantly new contribution to our understanding of the New Testament and opened up important fields for research'.
